A group of twelve students represented the delegation of our Lyceum to the International Medi.m.u.n. Conference, which took place at the European University between the 8th and 10th February 2019. Delegates were chosen based on an in-school essay competition. 45 students from all classes took part, the top 20 candidates had a personal interview from which the team was selected.

This year for the first time in the history of Medi.m.u.n. a student from a government school was chosen as a committee Chair. Our student Nicoletta Oratiou, chaired the Special Conference on the Child. This year Medi.m.u.n. was collaborating with the non-profit organization Hope for Children. The resolutions approved by the Medi.m.u.n. Special Conference on the Child are going to be forwarded to the secretariat of the United Nations for future consideration.

Our school was also represented with three students in the special committees. These are reserved for experienced debaters only. In the Historical Committee by Elina Marcou (C21), in the Special Conference on the Child by Annita Skoullou (C32) and in the International Court of Justice by Anna Nishiotis (B34).

In the four General Assemblies our school represented Chile and Chad. Our delegates were: Irene Erotocritou (A11) and Annie Tziakouri (A22) in General Asssembly 1, Nikitas Andreou (B34) and Antonis Paraskeva (C42) in General Assembly 2, Charis Martoudi (C11) and Anna-Maria Papachristou (C21) in General Assembly 3, and Christy Georgiou (B11) and Ioli Nicolaou (A11) in General Assembly 4.

All students worked hard to prepare for the conference in their free time at home and by attending the Friday afternoon Medi.m.u.n. debating club, chaired by Nicoleta Oratiou.

During the Conference, the Dazooo delegates took an active role in the debates both as main submitters in favour of their resolutions, or speakers against the resolutions of other teams, raised points of information and replied to points of information raised against theirs. Five out of the seven resolutions submitted by students of our school were passed.
